The Board of Directors accepted the Kropscott's gracious offer which included a farm house, barn, and approximately 40 acres of virgin timber. The Kropscott's wishes for this property are that it be used for educational purposes, agricultural purposes, and scientific studies pertaining to the environment and our natural resources. The Board of Directors has honored those wishes and continues to make this property a place for everyone to utilize and to visit.
